This Drive is simply an interesting way to get you to Broughton Castle. It is designed as a leisurely drive, although there are some good driving roads. The route uses a combination of B roads and lots of typically narrow, often bumpy, Cotswold country lanes. The entire Drive is about 81 miles long and can be completed in just over 3hrs without stopping. But please take your time, there are several beautiful and interesting places to stop and explore. During the Drive there are opportunities to stop for coffee, cake and a chat at Broadway Tower and /or Hidcote Gardens, a National Trust property, with free access to the café.

At the end of the Drive is the historic moated Broughton Castle. Access to the grounds and the café are free, the entrance fee for the Castle is £7 per person; you will need your MX5 Owners Club Membership Card to obtain this discounted rate, the usual cost is £9. The parkland outside the moated Castle provides an ideal space for a picnic - weather permitting!

If you decide to stop and explore during the Drive please remember to make a note of your mileage so that you can adjust the mileages for the remaining part of your Drive. But above all enjoy driving your MX5.

Please take care parts of the route are very popular with walkers, cyclists and horse riders, whilst other parts are narrow single-track roads with passing places.

Note: mileage readings may vary between different MX5's

Please zero your Trip Meter when leaving the car park.
